- 6. Family stressors, typical reactions to stress, and risk factors for family dysfunction.
- 7. Models for family involvement within early childhood classrooms and an understanding of the importance of this relationship.
- 8. Strategies for effective communication between home and school.
- 9. Collaboration skills which support effective partnerships with families.
- 10. Community resources both public and private that support families.
- 11. The advocacy role for teachers of young children.
- 12. Learning standards as they relate to families and community: the Virginia Foundation Blocks, the Child Development Milestones, The Virginia Standards of Learning and Core Competencies for Early Childhood Professionals.
- 13. Discuss the importance of listening attentively to family members as they share observations of their child's behavior or skills, and record the information for consideration in planning activities.
- 14. Students will identify how information provided in a transition profile can provide support to children and their families as they transition into preschool.
