Course Description

Studies fundamental principles of the law of torts and may include preparation and use of pleadings and other documents involved in the trial of a civil action. Emphasizes intentional torts, negligence, personal injury, products liability, and malpractice cases.

- Explain the theory of respondeat superior and liability
- Discuss negligence defenses and how they are used in a civil suit
- Identify the elements of intentional torts, both generally and for specific types of torts such as assault, battery, false imprisonment, fraud, invasion of privacy, and defamation
- Understand torts involving injury to the rights of property owners or possessors, such as trespass to land, trespass to chattel, and conversion

- Explain legal defenses that apply to intentional torts
- Differentiate strict liability from intentional torts and negligence actions and discuss the role that fault plays in strict liability cases
- Describe the elements and defenses in a products liability case and compare products liability with contract law warranties cases

- Discuss the types of tort immunity, including sovereign, public officials, children and family immunity
- Explain the procedures that paralegals use to investigate tort cases
