Course Description

VCCS Course Description: Examines American literary works from colonial times to the present, emphasizing the ideas and characteristics of our national literature. Involves critical reading and writing. Prerequisite ENG 112 or divisional approval. Part II of II. Lecture 3 hours per week. 3 credits.

VWCC Course Description: American Literature I begins with the birth of realism, extends through the trend toward naturalistic writing, and concludes with contemporary, postmodern works. The course will acquaint you with the social, political, religious, economic, and philosophical influences that have helped shape modern American literature. At the same time, it will enable you to trace the emergence of common themes and techniques by examining the writing of representative American authors.
