HIS 269 Civil War & Reconstruction

COURSE OUTLINE

Prerequisites: None

Course Description:

Studies factors that led to the division between the States. Examines the war, the home fronts, and the era of Reconstruction.

This course covers the events leading up to and including Southern secession, the Civil War, and Reconstruction, with an emphasis on the war years. The purpose of the course is to help guide students through an examination of Civil War myths, legends, and facts in an effort to gain a better understanding of the main issues of contention between the North and South and how the war played out.

It is a 3-credit course that may be taken for personal interest or transfer credit with the approval of the receiving institution. It is recommended that students complete History 121 (or the equivalent from another college) prior to taking History 269.

Course Outcomes:

At the completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- Trace the causes of secession and the Civil War
- Understand the real story behind popular myths and legends about the war
- Describe key factors that shaped the outcome of the war
- Appreciate how the war transpired (major battles and events)
- Explain the everyday challenges commonly faced by soldiers
- Describe famous individuals and the key roles they played
- Analyze the importance of slavery in the conflict and the fate of freedmen
- Explain how the nation was reunited through Reconstruction
