## **ENG 278 Appalachian Literature**

#### **Course Outcomes:**

### At the completion of this course, the student should:

- Be able to describe and discuss the boundaries and culture of Appalachia
- Have an understanding of the history of the region's literature as well as how the region and its people have been portrayed in the larger culture
- Read, analyze, support, and discuss interpretations of a variety of Appalachian literature
- Be able to discuss the work of a number of the region's writers, both classic and contemporary
- Produce a research project that critically examines a facet of the Appalachian region through literature. Examples might include the following: explain one Appalachian writer's work; explore the portrayals of Appalachia, past or present; compare various authors' representations of the region through literature; evaluate an Appalachian text(s) as cultural expression; and the like.

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## **Topical Description:**

- Introduction to the Appalachian region: overview of history, geography, culture, economy, environment, migration, politics, arts, social issues, and the like
- Appalachian identity and society: perspectives from inside and outside of the region
- Variety of genres of Appalachian literature, oral and written, mid-nineteenth century to the present
