Examines individuals in social contexts, their social roles, group processes and intergroup relations. Includes topics such as small group behavior, social behavior, social cognition, conformity, attitudes, and motivation.

PSY 216: Social Psychology

Course Outcomes:

At the completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Explain how research contributes to the understanding of social behavior: to evaluate and use research findings to investigate topics of interest to them.
- 2. Explain how ones interpersonal behaviors and the development of "self" affect social behaviors.
- 3. Identify relationships between thought processes (e.g., attributions, attitudes, bias, and perception) and social behavior.
- 4. Discuss obedience, conformity, and compliance in relation to behavior.
- 5. Describe the power of the situation.
- 6. Describe how group dynamics influence behavior.
- 7. Discuss the nature and effects of stereotyping, prejudice, and discrimination.
- 8. Discuss influences upon pro-social (e.g., altruism) and anti-social (e.g., aggression and conflict) behaviors.
- 9. Discuss factors influencing attraction and relationships.
- 10. Identify factors involved in influencing and persuading others.
- 11. Discuss social and cultural diversity.
- 12. Discuss psychological research examining diversity among individuals.
