# **Course Description**

VCCS Course Description: Examines major works of world literature. Involves critical reading and writing.

VWCC Course Description: English 251 will focus on a study of multicultural works from ancient times to 1500, offering students an opportunity to study major literary works in the context of cultural values and historical periods. Students will be expected to interpret, analyze and critique literature, focusing on a variety of genres. This course is writing intensive.
