### LAT 101 Beginning Latin I

#### COURSE OUTLINE

Prerequisites: None

### **Course Description:**

Teaches Latin grammar and composition. Introduces the translation of Latin literature, with special selections from authentic Latin authors. Part I of II. Lecture 3 hours per week. 3 credits (VCCS MCR Description)

Students will improve vocabulary, grammar and translation skills as they read selections from a variety of Roman authors. They will study any cultural topics relevant to the literature and relate the content to the social and political world of the literary piece. Students will concentrate on authors such as Ovid, Vergil, Horace, and Catullus. They will also study the metrical patterns of Latin poetry.
