Course Description

Surveys history of mental health from ancient to contemporary times, with special emphasis on impact of the Psychoanalytic, Humanistic, and Behavioral movements in the treatment of mental illness. Includes examination of structure and functions of human service delivery systems, knowledge and skills of mental health workers, and current ethical and legal issues.

The purpose of this course is to provide the student with a brief, historical overview of the mental health/human services field, from the Greek/Roman period to contemporary times in the United States. Special emphasis will be placed on the theoretical and technical applications of three of the early models of counseling, Psychoanalysis, Adlerian, and Person-Centered. In addition, the course will cover ethical and legal issues related to the profession.
