Course Description

Focuses on major crimes, including their classification, elements of proof, intent, conspiracy, responsibility, parties, and defenses. Emphasizes Virginia Law. May include general principles applicable, constitutional law and criminal procedures.

- Differentiate the various crimes against habitation, such as burglary, trespass, arson, and mischief

- Define inchoate crimes and explain the crime of attempt
- Identify the different defenses available to criminal defendants and apply them to various factual scenarios
- Identify common crimes against the state, public order, and morality
- Discuss various criminal procedures prior to trial, such as arrest and plea bargaining, and recognize the various types of pretrial motions
- Understand the steps and procedures necessary to the workings of a criminal trial
- Identify the goals of sentencing, and explain post-trial procedures and appeals
