- 8. Various agencies and support services providing early intervention for families with children having or at risk for special needs.
- 9. Competencies in using a variety of positive guidance strategies with young children with diverse needs.
- 10. Effective techniques for communicating and collaborating with families of children with special needs.
- 11. Observation and analysis of key elements of effective inclusive programming for young children.
- 12. Various professional pathways for careers in early childhood special education.
- 13. Explain the historical contributions and legal bases that form the foundation of early childhood special education and describe what inclusive sources in "natural environment" means for children with disabilities and their families.
- 14. Identify several forms of assistive technology and explain how assistive technology can be used with children with diverse needs.
- 15. Learning standards as they relate to exceptional children; the Virginia Foundation Blocks, the Child Development Milestones, the Virginia Standards of Learning and Core Competencies for Early Childhood Professionals.
