Course Description

VCCS Course Description: Studies major English works from the Anglo-Saxon period to the present, emphasizing ideas and characteristics of the British literary tradition. Involves critical reading and writing. Prerequisite ENG 112 or divisional approval. Part II of II. Lecture 3 hours per week. 3 credits.

VWCC Course Description: Beginning with the literature of the Romantic period (1785-1830) and continuing into the Victorian period (1830-1901) and the Twentieth Century and after (1901-present), the second semester of English literature will acquaint you with the social, political, religious, economic, and philosophical influences that have shaped it. A variety of literary forms – poems, plays, novels, myths, letters, and essays -- reflects these changing times. Works of recognized and enduring value will be studied.
